WV Delegate Asked To Apologize After Making Vulgar Statement

Gov. Jim Justice expressed frustration at members of the state legislature and likened their behavior to that of a mob in the final days of the legislative session.

According to Justice, who delivered his message in a press briefing on Friday, April 9, state legislators were “semi-out of control,” during a committee meeting at the beginning of April.

Justice explained that this behavior came about because members of the House viewed an issue one way while members of the Senate viewed it another way.

In order to discuss the bill (HB2003) further, a committee was formed. It was during the committee meeting that the alleged mini-insurrection occurred.

“I mean, it’s been told to me over and over, it mimicked the look of a mob in our state capitol,” Justice said. “Then, you had a delegate, and possibly others, but a delegate, Joe Jeffries from Putnam County, he got up screaming obscenities like you can’t imagine—honest to God, in our Capitol, I mean, a delegate.”

Senate Minority Leader Stephen Baldwin, in his April 7 edition of *The Back Pew*, explained the incident in more detail.

The legislature passed a bill, HB2003, that would limit the “governor’s ability to extend states of emergency without legislative input,” according to Baldwin.

“The House version of the bill required the legislature to be called into session anytime an emergency lasted more than 60 days. The Senate version required the governor to justify extending an emergency to the legislature, but did not trigger an automatic legislative session,” Baldwin wrote.

He added that he supported the Senate version of the bill, but when the two chambers could not agree, this committee of three delegates and three senators met for discussion.

Baldwin stated that “when we arrived at the meeting, over 30 delegates lined the halls chanting, yelling vulgarities, and attempting to intimidate senators into changing their votes.”

Delegate Todd Longanacre was in attendance during the committee meeting and gave the *West Virginia Daily News* his view of the events.

According to Longanacre, the term mini-insurrection is inappropriate for what happened.

In the Capitol building, the ceilings are high and the chambers echo with conversation, he explained.

“When you have several people in a hallway, and there are several conversations going on simultaneously, it can get rather noisy,” Longanacre said. “The sound reverberates up and down the hallway.”

He added that he could understand how a person would feel intimidated by this crowd, but that they were there to show support for the House delegation who were trying to negotiate with the Senate to get language put back into what they believed was a very strong bill.

“We were permitted to be there,” Longanacre said. “It was an open meeting.”

“Three dozen or more people were standing in the hallway because the committee room was too small for all us to be in,” Longanacre continued.

“There was no chanting, there was no yelling. I did not hear any vulgarities. I did not hear anything like that personally. We listened quietly,” Longanacre added.

Longanacre further said that a photograph of him with his thumb down was taken as he was letting others in the hallway know that the bill was dead.

As for Jeffries, Longanacre said that he was not present at the time he made his alleged comment, but others told him about it.

“I am not going to condone his behavior, but I am definitely not going to condemn the entire delegation for the acts of one individual,” Longanacre said.

As a result of this incident, Justice has asked that Delegate Jeffries make a public apology to Baldwin and others in attendance, or be kicked out of office.

On Friday, April 9, while still in session, Senator Mike Woelfel (Cabell) addressed the Senate and stated that he was going to leave out the exact word that Jefferies used, but that he directed the following question to the delegation: How does the governor’s [expletive] taste?

Jeffries made the following comment in response to a post on Senator Baldwin’s Facebook page:

“While I don’t deny the fact that I did make one statement AFTER the meeting, there was still no yelling or screaming at anyone. Not to mention only one sentence was said by me as I was leaving.”

In a later post on his own Facebook page, Jeffries wrote the following:

“It would seem to me that Governor Jim Justice is severely misinformed of what actually happened on April 2 after the conference committee on HB 2003. I will not be issuing any apology to him or anyone else for anything I actually said. There was no “mob yelling obscenities and foul language” at all. I believe the more than 30 people there, would’ve said something if that were true. It’s 100% false. If he would like to know the truth, perhaps he should go to the source. The Governor, the Senate, nor anyone else have not once asked me what happened on that day. Nor is it relevant to anything that’s going on today. *I have more important things to worry about than a dictator of a Governor or some butt hurt politicians who got their feelings hurt.*”

The West Virginia Daily New’s request for comment from Delegate Joe Jeffries was not immediately returned.

The legislative session ended on April 11.

Lady Spartans Rally to Win Thriller Over Princeton

Tensions were high and emotions were rolling on Tuesday night, April 13, when the Greenbrier East Lady Spartans hosted the Princeton Tigers in the first round of sectional tournament play.

The Spartans (14-5) trailed by 10 with six minutes left in the third quarter, but East outscored Princeton 34-16 from that point forward and held the Tigers to just six points in the decisive final period, winning the game 51-43.

East went ahead early in the contest 7-2 thanks in part to Cadence Stewart and Layla Pence, but the Tigers would score the next six points of the quarter and they held an 8-7 lead after one.

With Princeton (8-5) ahead 15-12 midway through the second quarter, East's Brooke Davis drilled a 3-pointer to knot the contest at 15-all, but just like the end of the opening period, Princeton scored six consecutive points again and led 21-15 at halftime.

And Princeton kept that momentum going in the early stages of the second half.

Kailey Sarver found Laken Dye for a wide-open layup and then Dye scored another bucket in close on the next possession. Dye would then act as the facilitator and hit Lauren Parrish with a crisp pass that Parrish would put in the hoop, and the Tigers took a commanding 27-17 lead with six minutes to go in the third quarter.

Then, the light switched for East.

Pence hit a short jumper and Stewart followed suit with a trey that brought the Spartans within five at 27-22. Davis then hit a long three and Allie Dunford added a long two. Princeton weathered the storm at that time though and led 37-32 heading to the fourth and final period.

With East down seven with 6:30 to go, Stewart hit another deep trifecta and Davis scored on a driving layup. A couple of possessions later, East took the momentum for good when Josie Patterson and Dunford executed a give-and-go to perfection when Patterson found her cutting teammate for an easy bucket. The next time down the floor, Davis gave East the lead for good with a left-wing three and a 44-43 Spartan advantage.

Stewart then hit a three, Davis blocked two 3-point attempts and East hit some critical free throws all sandwiched around a mini scrum that resulted in double technicals, and the Spartans celebrated their huge win.

Both teams exceeded 30 turnovers, but East's ability to come up with the big plays was the difference. The Spartans shot just 31%. Strangely enough, so did the Tigers.

Stewart led the Spartans with 19 points. The freshman Pence had 12 points, 11 rebounds and four steals. Davis added 12 points, 10 rebounds and five steals. She also had 11 turnovers, which she will need to clean up, but her motor runs so high that sometimes that is going to happen.

Princeton was led by Dye's 14 points.

The Spartans will take on the Woodrow Wilson Flying Eagles in Beckley this Thursday, April 15.

Big Performances Offer Big Hopes For Cavalier Postseason

CHARMCO, W.Va. — There was a postseason preview Tuesday night at Greenbrier West.

The Cavaliers, ranked seventh in the state in the latest Class A poll, got double-double performances from Lawson Vaughan, Chase McClung and Kaiden Pack, dodged early foul trouble and pulled away for an 87-60 boys basketball victory over Richwood.

Earlier in the day when the WVSSAC Group A, Region III seedings were released, West and the Lumberjacks were paired in a first-round match-up next Tuesday, April 20, in Charmco.

The Cavaliers toned down their full-court pressure to not show their hand for next week's win-or-go-home sectional game.

"They're going to have film on us, but I still think it's harder to prepare for it if you haven't seen it on the court," said West head coach Jared Robertson. "We're going to zone press, we're going to 2-2-1, we're going to 1-2-2, we'll half-court trap — we didn't half-court trap at all tonight. We'll mix our defenses a lot compared to what we did tonight."

Playing man-to-man defense the Cavaliers were pushed by the Lumberjacks for a quarter and a half, but pulled away with a 16-3 run that ended the first half.

Foul trouble and some shaky shot selection kept things close early.

"We have three guards that can all run the point for us and do a lot of things," said Robertson, referencing Pack, Chase Boggs and Brandon Oscar. "And all three of them were sitting over here with me (due to foul

trouble). But I thought our bench did a great job and then we got our guys back in and took control of the game.”

The Cavaliers also took their attack inside.

“We shoot too many threes a lot of games and this was one of them,” Robertson added. “We have some kids that can make threes, but we don’t need to shoot that many.”

West was 8-for-25 from behind the arc.

Vaughan had 16 points and 10 rebounds to lead the Cavalier attack, McClung added 15 points and 13 boards, while Pack had 11 points, 11 rebounds and a number of pinpoint assists.

McClung scored eight of his 15 in the opening quarter, keeping the Cavs close.

“The hardest working kid we have,” Robertson offered on McClung. “If he ever starts shooting the ball well, watch out. He started finishing plays tonight which is good. When you have a kid that’s probably 5-foot-11 and he leads your team in rebounds, that tells you something. I love that kid, I love how he plays.”

Leading 38-26 at the half, the hosts pulled away early in the third behind Pack. The senior found Boggs for a three, converted inside and assisted on a Vaughan score and another from Boggs in just over two minutes. Boggs was the fourth Cavalier in double figures with 13 points.

Brayden Spencer led Richwood (5-9) with 17 points, Camden Lawrence added 14 and Cooper Donahue scored 13.

West, now 8-6 and winners of three straight, will finish their regular season on Friday night, hosting Midland Trail, and begin sectional play against the Lumberjacks on Tuesday.

Webster County is the No. 1 seed in Section 2 and will host Meadow Bridge on Tuesday in the other semifinal. The sectional final is set for Thursday at the highest remaining seed.

Saturday night, West beat South Harrison High School, 73-63, to win the West Virginia Hometown Invitational Tournament.

Pack had a big 29-point game for the winners and was named to the all-tournament team.

Boggs, another all-tourney performer, added 11 points, while Oscar added 10.

2,000 Apply To W.Va. Move As Part Of Ascend WV, Lsbg. In Program

In 36 hours, 2,000 people from 38 states have filled out an application to move to West Virginia following the launch of the Ascend WV Remote Worker Program.

Gov. Jim Justice made this announcement during his Wednesday, April 14, Coronavirus press briefing.

The Ascend WV program was announced on Monday and will provide \$12,000 cash and a year's worth of free outdoor recreation to those who make the move into one of the state's first three host cities including Morgantown, Shepherdstown and Lewisburg.

At least 55,000 people have expressed an interest in the move to West Virginia since the launch, but 2,000 of them took the time to fill out the application, which can take up to an hour. Justice said. Currently, there are 50 spots available in Morgantown.

This partnership between WVU and the West Virginia Tourism Office aims to create new kind of marketing campaign, one that doesn't ask people to visit West Virginia but one that asks remote workers to live here.

The program will look to recruit folks looking to leave life in the big city to the refreshing beauty of West

Virginia. West Virginia has a quality of life that's hard to replicate anywhere else, Twilley stated. The recruitment program is solely to market West Virginia as a place to live, recreate and work remotely. One thing the WVU's remote worker program will not do is employ those who apply.

The program was made possible after a \$25 million dollar donation to West Virginia University by Brad and Alys Smith to recruit new residents to the Mountain State.

Additionally, during the press briefing, Coronavirus Czar Dr. Clay Marsh stated that West Virginia will receive guidance from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration regarding the pause on the Johnson and Johnson Coronavirus vaccine after it was discovered that some individuals experienced abnormal blood clotting following the injection.

The odds of this rare blood clotting are estimated to be one in a million, Marsh said.

Dr. Ayne Amjad added that the 54,000 doses of the Johnson and Johnson vaccine were administered in West Virginia. However, no blood clotting issues have yet occurred in the state.

"We want to stress that vaccination is important," Amjad said. "We have plenty of Moderna and Pfizer vaccines. We are ready to move as we need to, and we will get those to people who want them."

New River Gorge Park offers fishing events for grandfamilies

"The event will feature knot-tying, casting techniques, fish identification, and Leave No Trace, followed by the opportunity to cast a line (or many) into the New River," the park service said. Lunch will be provided between the activities.

Dear Abby: My husband's dad, "Adam," is very mellow and can talk to anyone. His mom, "Eve," is friendly, but a little more reserved.

Early in their marriage, Adam was a drinker, and my mother-in-law has never forgiven him for the way he treated her during that time. She has always treated him disrespectfully, but as they get older, it's becoming worse.

She has hit Adam when we had people over because he didn't do what she told him to do. I told her to stop, and my husband told her she embarrassed him, but Eve forgets or doesn't care and continues to do it. She talks down to him constantly. If that's how she acts when people are around, I hate to think what happens behind closed doors.

When she hits him, Adam sits there expressionless and doesn't react. He's not the man he once was, and he is adored by many people. What can we do to help my FIL and make her stop doing this in front of her grandkids and company? Eve claims to be a Christian, but isn't acting like one. — **Frustrated In Michigan**

Dear Frustrated: Your father-in-law may have had a drinking problem years ago, but he has a different problem now. He is a victim of verbal and physical abuse. He may have tolerated it all these years out of guilt for what he put his wife through when he was drinking. He may also have become so beaten down that he can no longer protect himself.

He does need help. With your and his son's encouragement, he can receive it because there are programs available for male victims of domestic violence. Stop Abuse for Everyone (SAFE) is an organization that helps abused individuals of all ages, genders, races and sexual orientations. The website is

Dear Abby: I met a nice friend. He's a widower whose wife has been gone for three years. My husband died 10 years ago.

He makes me laugh, something I haven't done in a while. I really like this guy, but he is still grieving. Some days he's good, but others he's a mess.

I want us to be in a relationship, and I think he could be "the one." We've only been courting for a month, but he has been pursuing me for a year. Should I give it more time, or should I move on with my life? I haven't been intimate with him, but he still makes me feel like a woman, which is something I've missed. — **Thinking It's Him In Maryland**

Dear Thinking: As you know, the process of grieving isn't a straight line. When a loved one dies, the survivors have good periods and ones that are less so. You are further along in this grieving process than your friend because his loss is more recent.

If a relationship (or more) is what you want, allow him more time to work through his feelings. However, if the bad spells don't become less frequent, suggest he talk with his doctor about joining a grief support group in which he can safely vent his feelings.
