The family will receive their family and friends from 6 p.m. till 8 p.m. on Wednesday, April 28, 2021 at the funeral home.

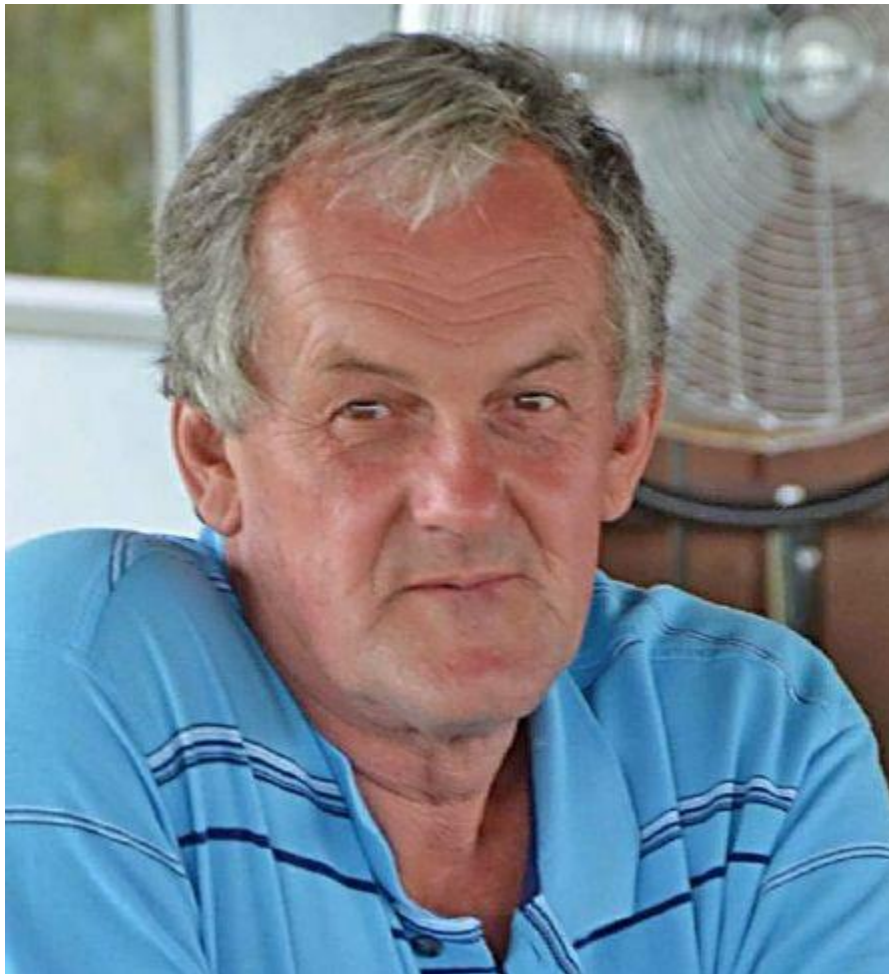

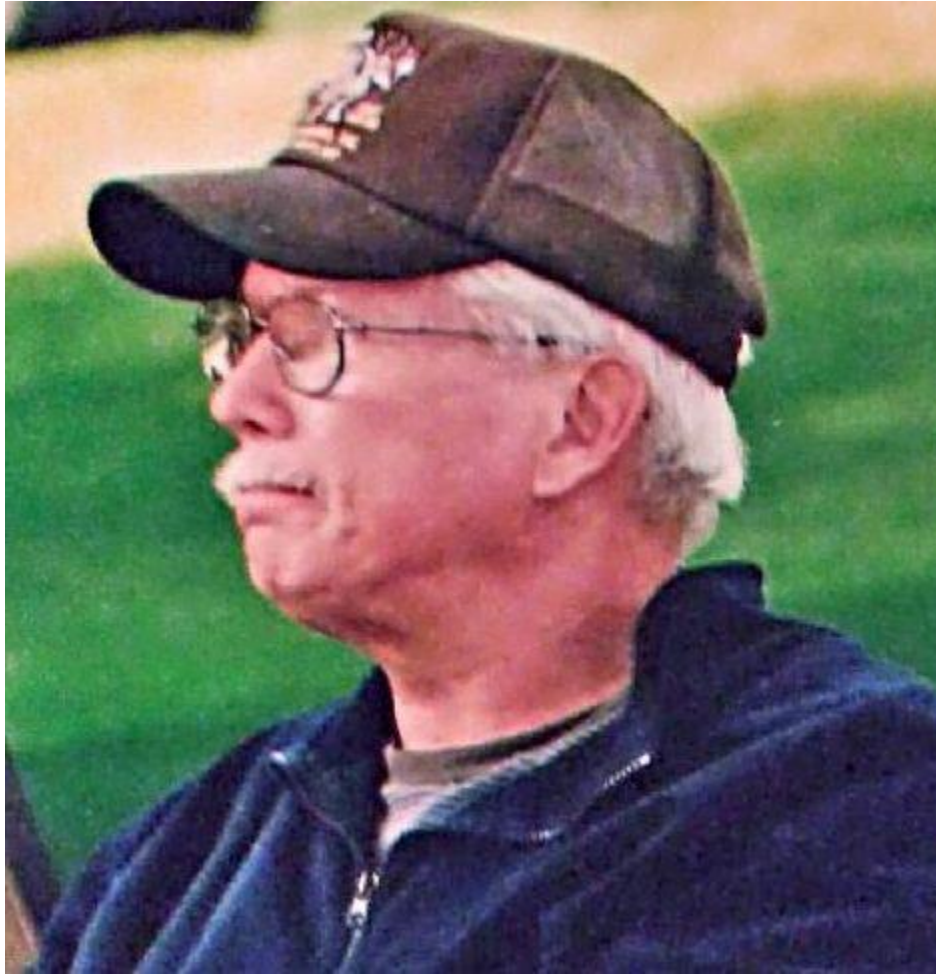

Fly Fishing Volunteers Needed For Trout Habitat Revitalization Project

Folks who love fly fishing are needed to help give one Greenbrier County creek a face-lift.

According to Bronson Cody Brown, vice president of the Southern WV Chapter of Trout Unlimited, volunteers are needed to help revitalize a section of Milligan Creek located on Miller Mountain Road just off Route 60 between Alta and Lewisburg in the community known as Richlands.

The structures in the creek that provide trout a place to prosper and to hide from predators have failed, Brown said. For this reason, Brown and others decided to apply for the appropriate permits and speak to the landowner about habitat revitalization.

The property owner, Dan Hart, has given permission to allow public access to this section of Milligan Creek, but it is fly fishing only, Brown said. The creek comes out of a cave about 75 yards above the “fly fishing only” section, and averages 8-10’ wide.

The waters are pristine and will allow for great fly fishing opportunities, according to Brown.

For those interested in helping with habitat revitalization efforts, a special meeting will be held at 4:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 18, at Milligan Creek. It will be an outdoor meeting.

To get to the special section of the creek where the meeting will be held, Brown said to travel approximately one mile up Miller Mountain Road, a one-lane gravel road, to a parking area next to an old cargo unit of a tractor-trailer.

Volunteering will take place over several weekends and will involve physical labor, but food and drinks will be

supplied by the chapter.

Ronceverte Remains Under “Boil Water” Advisory

At approximately 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, April 29, officials from the City of Ronceverte made the community aware of another water-line break, leaving some customers without water. This comes after a previous water-line break which has left parts of Ronceverte under a “boil water advisory” for the eighth-consecutive day.

Through a post on social media, city officials said, “Water will be restored as soon as possible for those customers without water due to the line break. We are still on Boil Water.”

On Wednesday, a tanker-truck was brought in from Charleston to provide drinking water for area residents impacted by the situation. The water truck is situated on Edgar Avenue, across from Tri-County Produce. Water is available between the hours of 8:00 a.m. And 8:00 p.m. daily. Residents are advised to bring their own containers.

City officials wish to remind residents that while under a “boil water advisory”, “Please boil water for cooking, drinking, brushing teeth, etc. It can be used for showers but be careful if you have any cut or abrasion on your skin. You should boil your water in those cases.”

City officials further state, “We understand this is an inconvenience. But to complete the necessary upgrades, this is a necessity.

Volunteers Needed In Rainelle For Make It Shine Event

JROTC Achieve Honor Unit With Distinction

The Monroe County Technical Center and James Monroe High School's JROTC Maverick Battalion has earned the title of Honor Unit with Distinction by the Department of Defense's United States Army Cadet Command. This distinction came as a result of scoring a 99.25% on a JROTC Program of Accreditation (JPA) evaluation, an in-depth inspection that JROTC programs are subjected to every three years and ultimately determines if a school is permitted to retain its JROTC program or not.

The JPA categories evaluated were individual portfolios, personality traits, learning style inventories, team building methodologies, drill and ceremonies, and color guard duties. The evaluation also included two very detailed cadet-led presentations. One was a Continuous Improvement Plan (CIP) briefing whereby cadets focused upon individual and unit physical fitness observations, mitigation, and percentage of improvements over time. The other was a community-oriented Service Learning Project (SLP), which focused on different ways of actively honoring our local veterans.

Both the CIP and SLP briefings were planned and executed by the cadets and offered opportunities to identify a problem, develop courses of action, analyzing different courses of action, choose a course of action, plan,

and execute tasks to achieve workable solutions.

We are proud of these young people as they demonstrated their ability to think critically and objectively while working individually and within a team to achieve success.
