Jackie Eugene Fox, known to friends and family, as Jack or Grandpa Jack, 88, of Lewisburg, WV, passed away peacefully on May 14, 2021.

Jack was born in Mt. Hope, WV to the late Genevieve and Joseph Fox. He spent most of his youth in Rainelle, WV and graduated from Rainelle High School in the Class of 1949. He graduated from Concord College in 1952. He also attended Notre Dame in the School of Law; however, his heart always led him back to the field of education. Teaching was his passion.

On May 27, 1953, on the eve of his 21st birthday and on a blind date, Jack met Prudence Elwinger and knew before midnight that she was the one. Prudence was invited on the blind date by her twin sister, Penelope, who at the time was dating a Marine who happened to be a friend of Jack's at Camp Pendleton. The wedding of Jack and Prudence took place on June 30, 1956 at St. James Episcopal Church in Newport Beach, CA. They were married for 57 years, with the passing of Prudence on March 27, 2014.

Sargent Jack Fox served in the United States Marine Corp from 1954 - 1962. He also taught and coached in Alderson, WV, followed by Western Kentucky State and as a graduate student at University of Arkansas. Jack's Master of Education thesis was on the writings of William Faulkner. Jack enjoyed all literature; yet, had an

affinity for Faulkner and truly identified with his main characters and style of prose. Jack was a gifted writer, poet, and from a very young age, a student of the Scriptures.

For many years, Jack coached hundreds of young people in baseball, basketball, and football. He built connections with his young athletes from Alderson, WV; Montgomery Bell Academy in Nashville, TN; to youth sports leagues in Needham, MA. In his later years, Jack continued to hear from many of his former athletes, as they spoke of the wisdom and ever-present commitment to never quit, which he instilled in them. Throughout his lifetime, Jack loved sports and the many powerful life lessons offered.

As he continued to serve in the field of education, Jack worked for many years in the college textbook publishing industry for the following firms: Houghton Mifflin in Boston, W.B. Saunders in Philadelphia, Wadsworth Publishing, and International Thomson Publishing, until retirement in 1995.

In 2004, Jack's faith and devotion to daily reading and teaching of God's Word led him to further study and complete the process of becoming an ordained pastor at Fairlea Baptist Church. After his ordination, Jack went on to teach Bible study and assisted with fellowship at Fairlea Baptist. He also traveled to churches throughout West Virginia, where he delivered sermons and connected with parishioners as an itinerant and interim pastor.

Jack's passion for the Word of God also led him to many assisted living facilities, where he would gather with residents for Sunday service or evening prayer. It was through an invitation for Prudence to join the choir at St. James Episcopal Church that Jack devoted his final years as a deacon, reader, and servant of the Lord within this caring community. He believed in and loved Jesus Christ.

Jack's passion for running was endless. Just like his earlier coaching of youth, he personally exemplified an ever-present commitment to never quit. Throughout his 88 years and in many states, Jack consistently laced up his running shoes and put one foot in front of the other. He was known, by many, as the consummate runner and advocate for a fitness lifestyle. He ran through the hills of West Virginia and various states from the time he was a boy until the summer of 2020. Jack was, and will always be, an inspiration for many.

Jack was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Prudence. He is survived by his son, Joseph Fox of Winter Haven, FL; and three daughters, Cynthia Fox Barney of Annapolis, MD, Rita Fox of Millville, NJ, and Judith Cole of Lewisburg. He was the proud Grandpa Jack to eight grandchildren, Daniel Flynn, Rhiannon Hayes, Chelsea Fox, Jackson Fox, Joseph 'Tyler' Contarino, William Contarino, Dylan Cole, and Amelia Cole. He also had four bonus grandchildren, Phil and Jeff Alicea and Robert and Alicia Barney. Grandpa Jack also joyfully celebrated the births of fourteen great-grandchildren.

A Memorial Service will take place on June 19th at 1 p.m. at St. James Episcopal Church, 468 Church Street, Lewisburg, WV 24901. A reception will follow and more information will be provided.

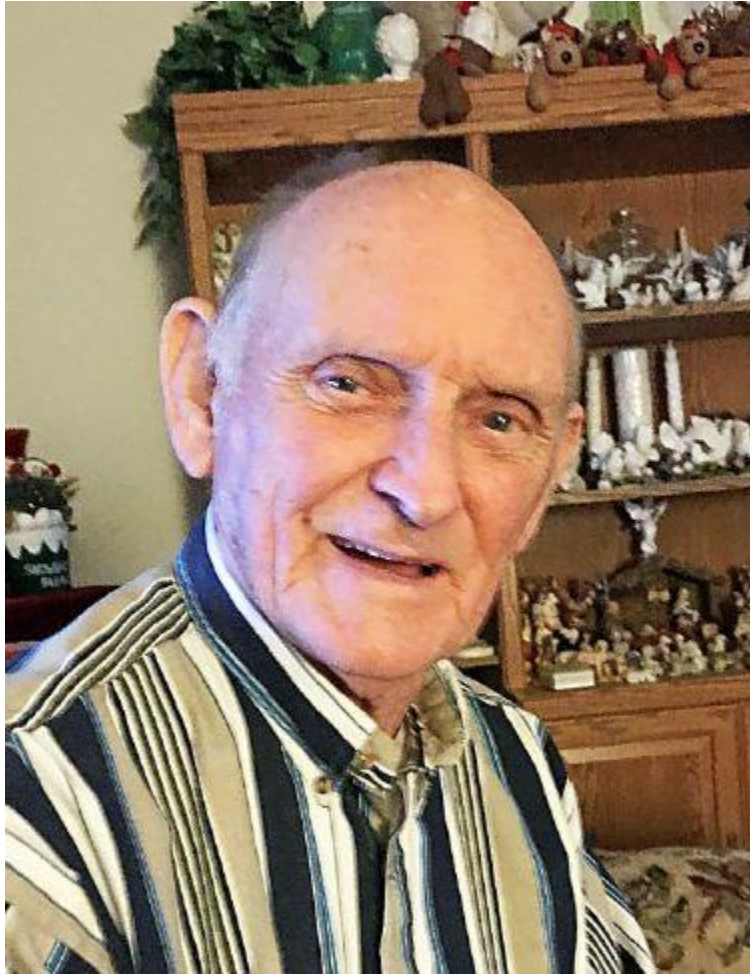

Morrissey, Burial Vault Provider Reach Settlement

West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey has reached a settlement with a burial vault retailer to resolve allegations the company accepted payment for items that it did not deliver.

The business, Moreland Burial Vault Company, will pay West Virginia more than \$18,600 to fully reimburse affected consumers. It also agreed to pay the state \$1,544 in civil penalties with the potential of nearly \$5,000 in additional penalties should the company or its owners violate terms of the settlement.

The Attorney General met with affected consumers Tuesday.

“Burial monuments and memorials represent a sensitive purchase with precious meaning to the consumers involved,” Attorney General Morrisey said. “It is imperative that all companies, but especially those dealing with burial and funeral services, deliver the goods and services that consumers expect. This case demonstrates that our office will vigorously enforce consumer protection laws no matter how small or large the violation may be.”

The out-of-court settlement resolves complaints that Moreland Burial Vault Company of Moundsville and its owners – George A. and Nancy L. Bennett of Washington, Pa. – accepted payment, yet failed to deliver monuments and memorials to 10 consumers.

The affected families, who reside in Beech Bottom, Glen Dale and Moundsville, will receive full restitution payments of between \$896 and \$5,084.

The settlement further requires Moreland Burial Vault to prepare a contract with specified details for any future sale of burial monuments or memorials, including headstones, benches, plaques, pictures, vases and candleholders or any related service, such as engraving.

The company must also comply with installation and completion dates set forth in each consumer’s contract, according to the settlement. It further limits any deposit to 10 percent of the purchase price and prohibits the company from demanding additional payment until the products are fully installed and/or completed.

In a related matter, Moreland Burial Vault agreed to resolve similar allegations with Pennsylvania Attorney General Josh Shapiro. The two-state settlement requires Moreland Burial Vault to pay \$4,826 to cover consumer restitution and other matters in Pennsylvania. It also agreed to \$3,000 in suspended civil penalties should the company or its owners violate terms of the settlement.

The company furthermore agreed to additional restitution should any other consumers come forward with a similarly valid and legitimate complaint in either state.

Marlinton Woman Charged With Assaulting Officer, Dog

A Pocahontas County woman was arrested on the evening of Thursday, May 27 after allegedly breaking into multiple residences and attacking one family's dog. Ina Belle Pennington, 47, of Marlinton, has been charged with public intoxication, entering without breaking, petit larceny, cruelty to animals and assaulting an officer.

Shortly before 9:00 p.m. on the date in question, officers responded to a 1st. Avenue home in Marlinton to investigate reports of an intoxicated woman entering several homes in search of alcohol and cigarettes. Upon their arrival, officers located the woman, identified as Ina Belle Pennington, and confirmed to be intoxicated, in a vehicle parked outside the home.

According to the criminal complaint, while attempting to speak with Pennington, officers stated that she would only respond in "smart retorts."

Officers then advised Pennington that she was under arrest. The complaint further states that, while attempting to place Pennington in handcuffs, she resisted and demanded "that she be allowed to smoke her cigarette." Pennington then allegedly attempted to remove one officer's firearm, at which point she was taken to the ground and subdued.

According to the first victim's statement, Pennington entered his home through the front door, "opened the refrigerator door [] took a beer can and a half-pint of liquor and began drinking them", before being told to leave.

Pennington allegedly left with the victim's alcohol, before entering the second victim's home across the street, also through the front door. Pennington encountered a dog in the second home and reportedly attacked it. Pennington allegedly kicked the animal, causing it to retreat to a corner and urinate on the floor. The victim,

who was alerted to the situation by the sound of the dog barking, immediately ordered Pennington to leave the home. Before exiting, Pennington allegedly attempted “to solicit cigarettes and alcohol while he was confronting her.”

Ina Belle Pennington is currently being held at Tygart Valley Regional Jail on a \$12,100 cash-bond or surety.

When bad things happen to good people, good community members often leap at the chance to make a horrible situation better.

Recently, lawn maintenance equipment was stolen from Bimbo Chapman, a Lindside man who takes pride in his yard work.

Via the Facebook page, Monroe County WV News, group members, administrators and moderators reached out to one another to help right this wrong against a much-loved resident. A collection drive began through a gofundme account, and there are ongoing discussions around bake sales, collection jars and bank accounts. With permission from Chapman’s family, Katlin Wetterman, a moderator for Monroe County WV News, organized the fundraising account with the challenge, “Some low life stole Bimbo’s mower and wagon! Bimbo uses these to make a living. If you’ve gone through Lindside you’ve seen his smiling face and joyful waving! Bimbo is the sweetest person and does nothing [bad] to anyone! If you can, let’s help him replace his equipment as a community.”

Challenge excepted. Within 13 hours of creation, “The Help Bimbo replace his stolen equipment!” gofundme page had blown the original goal of \$400 out of the water and reached \$1,700 and climbing.

“We hope to get the mower, weed eater, riding mower and a wagon to start with for large and small jobs,” Sommer Graham, an administrator for Monroe County WV News, told The West Virginia Daily News. “Bimbo had mowed yards for free as well as donations and this would help with larger yards. Anything extra we raise we hope to rent a secure storage unit to store them in so no one can take his stuff again. Bimbo is deaf and mute but can find a way to smile and communicate and has a heart of gold. This man is someone everyone looks forward to driving by and seeing.”

Ronceverte Election Shows Great Voter Turnout

The city of Ronceverte experienced great voter turnout in a historical election that saw four qualified candidates contend to become mayor.

Based on the number of votes for mayor alone, at least 211 residents cast their ballot on Tuesday, June 1.

It has been a difficult campaign season as the city grapples with water issues, the uncertainty surrounding the Covid-19 pandemic and the want to rebuild Ronceverte's economy. But, after two meet the candidate forums and local interactions with those running for office, citizens had their chance to decide who should lead Ronceverte forward.

According to information provided by city of Ronceverte officials, the following tallies are the unofficial votes each candidate received:

Mayor: Eric Mercer- 37; Barbara Morgan- 18; Deena Pack- 149; Mark Mengel- 7.

Four Year City Council: Leah Sills- 137; Richard Beasley- 63.

Two Year City Council: Kathy King- 144; Aaron Ransom- 67; Tanya Hazelwood- 108.

Deena Pack will take over the position of mayor, Leah Sills will hold a council seat for four years and Kathy King and Tanya Hazelwood both will hold office for two year city council terms.

"I'd like to thank Barbara Morgan, Mark Mengel and Eric Mercer for their enthusiasm during this campaign," said incoming Mayor Deena Pack. "I know that we all love Ronceverte and want only the best for everyone that lives here. I also want to thank the citizens of Ronceverte for coming out to vote in higher numbers than we've seen in a long time. I'm excited for our city's future and can't wait to start working with city council, the city administrator and the city employees to keep moving Ronceverte in the right direction."

Terry Armentrout, city manager, also spoke regarding the high voter turnout.

"We were very happy with the large turnout," said Armentrout. "Everything went very smoothly."

The polls closed at 7:30 p.m. and the results were in by 10 p.m. on election day.

Although these results are unofficial, the official canvassing of the votes will take place on June 7, and certified results will be announced within 48 hours. Also, June 7 marks the final day that absentee ballots postmarked by election day will be accepted.

Those elected to office will begin their term on July 1, 2021.

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office Needs Help.

Around 6 in the morning of June 1, a vehicle crash occurred on Route 219 near Charley Ballard Road.

This crash was caused by either a gray or silver Nissan or Toyota car possibly made in the 90s, according to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office. "This vehicle was traveling south on Route 219 and started to pass several vehicles while traffic was traveling northbound. A vehicle had to slam on its brakes that was traveling south so the one that was passing could get back in the southbound lane. When this happened the vehicle behind it rear-ended that vehicle. A van traveling northbound had to swerve into the southbound lane to avoid a head-on crash with this vehicle."

June 2 Sexual Assault Victim Seeks Distance From Perpetrator

Dear Abby: I was sexually assaulted by my cousin's boyfriend a short while ago, and it was hard for me to process. When I told my cousin about it, she acknowledged that it wasn't OK, but made it all about her. Although we are extremely close, I didn't get the type of support I was hoping for. In the end, she got back with him, and casually contacts me trying to sweep things under the rug.

I have been sitting on a message for a couple of weeks that I want to send to her, telling her I don't want to be in contact with her for a while. It's hard for me, because we're family. Because nobody knows the whole story, everyone is quick to think I'm the one "isolating" her from my life. What do I do, Abby? — **Stuck and Lost in New York**

Dear Stuck and Lost: The person who assaulted you is a predator, and your cousin appears to be clueless. Inform her that, under the circumstances, as long as her boyfriend is in the picture, you will be keeping your distance because you no longer feel safe around him.

And please, rather than stay silent about what her boyfriend did to you, TELL your friends and family what happened. Contact the Rape, Abuse and Incest National Network for support and guidance. (It's the largest anti-sexual violence organization in the U.S.) The toll-free number to call is 1-800-656-HOPE, or if you prefer, chat online at rainn.org. Whether you were assaulted or raped, file a police report so it will be on record in case he does it to someone else, which he may.

Dear Abby: My son and daughter-in-law are divorcing after almost 10 years. We love them both, and the divorce is amicable. They own a home, and my DIL is staying there.

My son is very easygoing and doesn't need the "finer" things in life. He has a truck. He built a small camper in the back, and there is a camper shell. We have asked him to move back in with us. He's going to school with about two years to go, and also works a full-time job. They had a fair amount of savings, but he doesn't want to buy a house right now. He thinks that since he is happy living in his truck, he should do that rather than waste money on an apartment. I assume that when the weather turns cold or he needs to take a shower or do a load of laundry, you have let him know that he is welcome to avail himself of your hospitality — and have a nice dinner — anytime he wishes. There are "helicopter" moms and "hell-i-copter" moms. You are neither. You are a loving, caring mom.

Dear Abby: I need advice on hot tub etiquette. If I were to invite a nudist lady to soak with me in a hot tub, would it be impolite for me to ask her to wear a mask? — **Ray in New York**
