She and her sister grew up on the farm there in the ancestral home built by her great-grandfather. A graduate of Union High School, Union, WV, Class of 1963, she attended Marshall University and National Business College (Roanoke), where she discovered her aptitude for accounting.

During a vacation in Jacksonville, FL, Linda met the love of her life; and she and Darryl David Weiss were wed in Sparta, NC on December 23, 1964. They spent most of their career years in the Minneapolis, MN area, where Linda worked in accounting at several major corporations; her favorite being International Harvester, perhaps feeling a special connection to its production of the farm machinery she knew from childhood.

She and Darryl vacationed on an ocean cruise early in their married life and thus began a lifelong love of travels by sea. Guilt After Friend's Death Calls For Self-Forgiveness

DEAR ABBY: My dearest friend passed away five years ago. He was a severe alcoholic, and his death resulted from it. I was aware of how bad things had gotten and I was trying to talk him into getting help. I live across the country but visited and spoke with him often. I was considering telling his parents how bad things were since they were mainly supporting him, but I was torn because he was an adult, and I didn't know if it would be appropriate. Well, while I was considering it, he passed away, and I haven't been able to get over the guilt. I feel like I should've done more. I have a strong urge to tell his parents I knew how he was doing and was contemplating telling them and how sorry I am that I didn't. Would it be selfish, like rubbing salt in their wounds, just so I can find some kind of peace? I have been going back and forth with this since his death. I have such regret that I didn't do something more. I don't know if their forgiveness would help me, or if I'd just be hurting them more. Your opinion on this would be helpful. — FULL OF REGRETS

DEAR FULL: Please forgive yourself and stop second-guessing. You are guilty of nothing more than being a caring friend. The deceased was responsible for his own alcohol-related death. If his parents were supporting him financially, they were already aware their son had a serious problem. Because after five years you cannot stop flogging yourself, you have two options: Discuss this with your religious adviser, or ask your doctor or your insurance provider to refer you for some sessions with a licensed psychotherapist with whom you can work through this.

DEAR ABBY: I have had a girlfriend for about three years, but I have recently begun to feel indifferent about our relationship. We have to travel at least 45 minutes to see each other and don't always see each other on weekends. I have been trying to convince her to move into my townhome, but something new arises each time I bring it up. Recently, a younger woman (she's 21, I'm 32) showed an interest in me during one of my sports games. I have talked to her and won't let any relationship develop outside of being friends. She's religious and I'm not, and that's a deal-breaker for me. I'm torn between continuing to try to build my current relationship, trying to pursue the new one, or taking a step back from relationships to focus on my personal goals. Any thoughts, Abby? — PONDERING IN PENNSYLVANIA

DEAR PONDERING: It doesn't appear that you OR your girlfriend of three years is really ready to take things to the next level. If you were, you wouldn't be debating whether to trade her in for a newer model. As to the younger one, you just stated clearly that her religiosity is a deal-breaker for you. Your third option makes the most sense. Concentrate on your personal goals for a while, and with time, your love life will work itself out.

Summers County Library Wants Your Helping Standing Up Against Bullying

Bullying is a widespread problem throughout the United States. According to the CDC, “about 1 in 5 high school students reported being bullied on school property and more than 1 in 6 high school students reported being bullied electronically in the last year.” This data was last reviewed in October of 2020. The Summers County Public Library is taking a stand against bullying with a new anti-bullying campaign.

The campaign is called Super Human and is putting out the call for all “superheroes” to step forward and stand against bullying. The CDC reports that 14% of public schools reported that bullying issues occur daily or at least “once a week.” This same report details that middle schools have the highest reported bullying at 28%. High schools come in second at 16%. This is followed by combination schools leaving primary schools with the lowest amount at only nine percent. Cyberbullying rates are higher in all categories except primary schools.

Out of the youth experiencing bullying, many of them fall within a minority group. Those in the LGBTQIA+ community have the highest rate with almost 40% of high school students who are openly part of the community experiencing bullying in the data year. The next highest is female students. Approximately 30% of female students were bullied in the given timeframe. Unfortunately, the list goes on.

Stopbullying.gov defines bullying as “unwanted, aggressive behavior among school-aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance.” The definition goes on to say, “The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time.” There are multiple types of bullying; physical, verbal, relational/social and damage to property of the victim. Bullying can occur in person as well as through technological means also known as cyberbullying. Physical bullying is exactly what it sounds like, hitting, kicking, even tripping someone. Verbal often includes name-calling and teasing while relational/social often

looks like spreading rumors or leaving someone out in a group setting. These are all examples given by the CDC but are not inclusive of all possible definitions.

Anyone who signs the anti-bullying pledge with The Summers County Library will receive a free bracelet while supplies last. Be the change, be superhuman and become a superhero.

In addition to the anti-bullying campaign, the library is also starting a culture club. The club will meet once a month beginning in September. Each meeting will consist of learning about a different culture from around the world. The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines the word "culture" as meaning, "the customary beliefs, social forms and material traits of a racial, religious or social group: the characteristic features of everyday existence (such as diversions or a way of life) shared by people in a place or time." This can include the language that is spoken, how the people dress and the holidays they celebrate.

September's Culture Club Meeting will be about Israel. Currently, meetings are planned for the first Tuesday of each month at 5:00 at the library.

GVT Updates Safety Guidelines

Here at GVT we are constantly learning, processing, and evolving with the changing news of COVID-19 and its variants. We realize that this has been a difficult and frustrating time for many. With that being said, as we continue to move towards our upcoming production of Shout! The Mod Musical, we have a few updates in accordance with the CDC, our agreement with Actors Equity Association, as well as protocols that many theatres around the country are implementing.

Please refer to this FAQ or our updated Restart Guide for questions you may have

Will I need to wear my mask to the theatre if I'm vaccinated?

-Yes, due to rapid changes caused by the Delta variant and breakthrough cases, all patrons will be required to wear a facial covering while inside the entry hall, lobby, and the theatre.

Will I need to wear my mask during the performance?

-Yes, we are asking all patrons to wear their facial covering throughout the entire performance. If you are not wearing a mask ushers or staff will respectfully ask you to put one on and provide it if necessary.

Will I need to present my vaccination card to attend a performance at GVT?

-No, currently we will not be requiring proof of vaccination to attend a performance. However as we continue to monitor COVID it may become a requirement.

Will there be social distancing?

-Yes, we are reducing audience capacity by 30% and will do our best to distance accordingly.

Will concessions be available during this production?

-Yes, at the moment we are planning on re-opening our concessions / bar amenities. We simply ask that you remove your mask to enjoy your concessions, then promptly reapply your face covering.

Will I be able to take my concessions into the theatre?

-No, unfortunately at this time while all patrons are seated in the theatre, we ask that everyone remains masked. Please enjoy your concessions in the lobby before the show starts.

What is the theatre doing to ensure safety beyond requiring masks?

-The theatre lobby, seats, and high touch areas are thoroughly cleaned prior to every performance. We will happily provide masks to those who do not have them, hand sanitation stations are located throughout the venue, our new HVAC system is equipped with MERV13 filters and has an air exchange ratio of 7-8 times per hour within the theatre.

What if something happens to impact my comfortability during a performance?

-If there is a circumstance that causes you some sort of discomfort during a performance we ask that you seek

out a staff member that will happily be able to help you.

What if I am not feeling well the date I have tickets for?

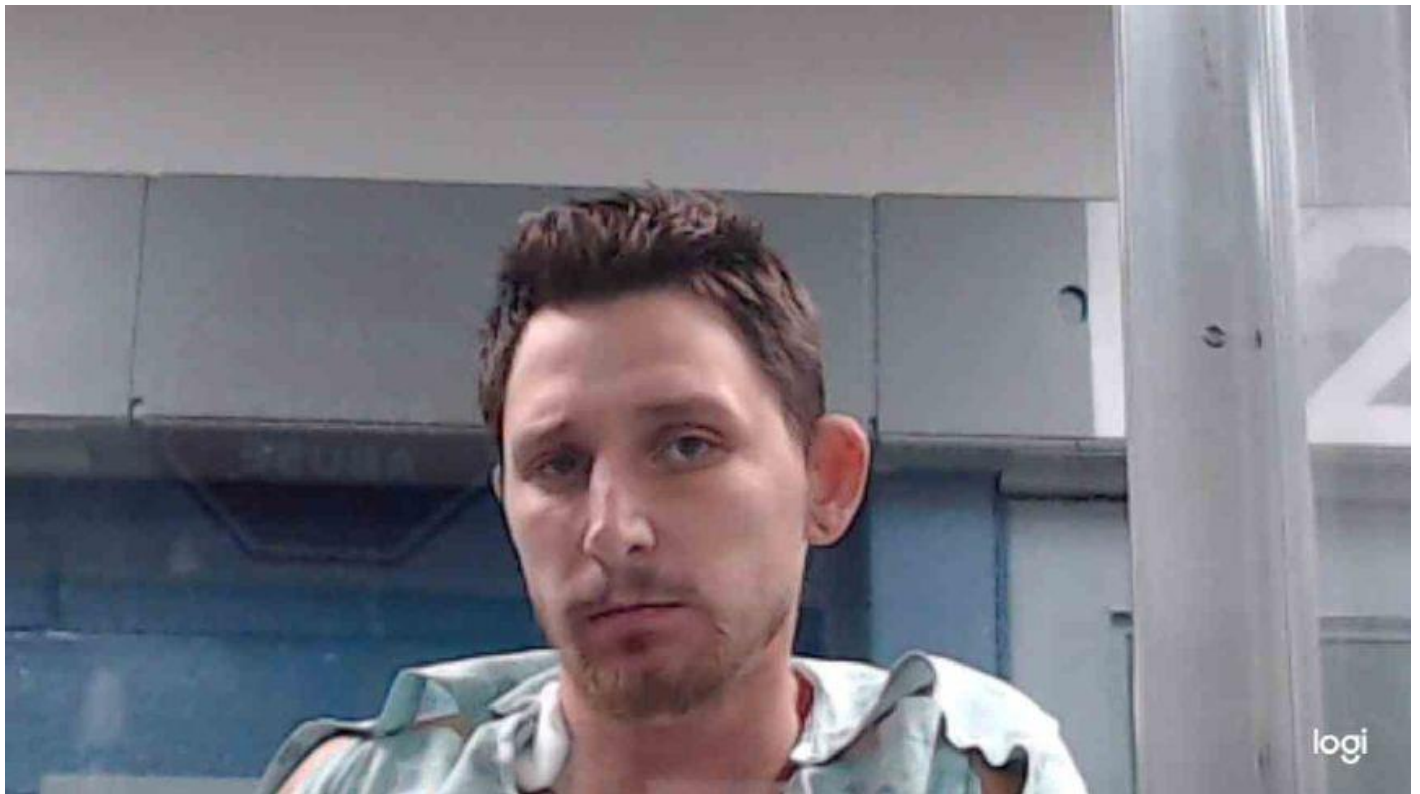
-We ask that if you have a high fever or are experiencing any symptoms that are related to COVID-19 that you stay home. We will happily work with you to exchange tickets for another date.

New Jersey Man In Jail Following Altercation With Sheriff's Deputy

A New Jersey man has been booked at South Central Regional Jail after being released from Charleston Area Medical Center for treatment of gunshot wounds sustained during an altercation with a Fayette County Sheriff's Deputy.

Jerome Howard Friedman Jr., 32, was booked on Aug. 10 on charges of malicious assault, obstructing-attempt to disarm an officer, and fleeing with reckless indifference after an incident that occurred on Aug. 2 and continued into the early morning of Aug. 3.

According to the criminal complaint filed in Fayette County, Friedman allegedly stole a 2006 Chevy Impala from the KFC in Flatwoods in Braxton County at approximately 9:30 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 2. At around 2:30 a.m. on Tuesday, Deputy Massile of the Fayette County Sheriff's Department received a "Be On The Lookout" call from Fayette County 911 regarding a reckless driver.

Massile was able to set up along US Route 19 when he witnessed the vehicle traveling at a high rate of speed towards Oak Hill.

While attempting a traffic stop, the officer noticed that Friedman "made an abrupt and reckless exit from US 19 at the Sheetz intersection, narrowly missing two guardrail ends and a road sign," the complaint states. "The vehicle continued down the embankment striking a culvert/drainage area which caused extensive damage to the vehicle."

The officer observed as the vehicle ran over a curb into the Sheetz parking lot, traveled down a dirt access road behind Sheetz and entered into a field.

At this time, the driver, later identified as Friedman, exited the vehicle and started running. The officer took off on foot after him where he was found lying in a "rock pile attempting to conceal himself," the complaint continues.

While attempting to restrain Friedman, "the accused began to fight with [the officer] and ended up in the dominant position over Deputy Massile who ended up on his back putting the men face to face." Friedman then allegedly attempted to disarm the officer by "grabbing at his gun and holster area."

"While fighting back and yelling for help, Deputy Massile utilized a secondary weapon, a knife, he carries on his person and stabbed the accused in the lower back in an effort to preserve his own life. This action gave Deputy Massile time to draw his duty weapon, however the accused did not cease his attack and went back to the gun holster still attempting to disarm the Deputy," the complaint states. "At this point Deputy Massile began to discharge his duty weapon at the accused. Several rounds struck the accused at which time he fell off of Deputy Massile and away from him stopping the attack."

Additional officers arrived and were able to provide medical assistance until Friedman was taken to Charleston Area Medical Center. Deputy Massile also suffered from an injury and was treated and released.

Officers with the Oak Hill detachment of the West Virginia State Police conducted an investigation into the incident and formally filed criminal charges against Friedman on Aug. 4.

His cash only bail has been set at \$50,000.

Fayette County Man Facing Felony Sexual Abuse Charges

A Fayette County man is at Southern Regional Jail facing felony charges of sexual abuse involving an 11-year-old female.

Robert William Kaylor, 56, of Victor, was booked on Aug. 12, after the female victim came forward to those at Just For Kids advocacy center stating that she had been touched both over and under her clothes by Kaylor and that he had exposed himself to her while touching himself when she was between the ages of 5-6, according to a criminal complaint filed in Fayette County.

The victim stated that Kaylor had also touched and exposed himself to a 10-year-old male during the same time.

Kaylor denied these allegations during an interview with officers at the West Virginia State Police detachment in Oak Hill stating that "he would not have done these things due to them being very wrong," the complaint continues.

Kaylor has been charged with two counts of sexual abuse by a parent, guardian or custodian and two charges of sexual abuse in the first degree.

His surety/cash bond has been set at \$100,000.
