COVID-19 Daily Update

CHARLESTON (WVDN) — The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) reports as of Fe. 24, 2022, there are currently 3,336 active COVID-19 cases state-wide. There have been 38 deaths reported since the last report, with a total of 6,288 deaths attributed to COVID-19.

DHHR has confirmed the deaths of a 69-year old male from Putnam County, a 78-year old male from Kanawha County, a 71-year old female from Calhoun County, a 73-year old female from Harrison County, a 77-year old male from Mercer County, a 77-year old male from Jackson County, a 53-year old male from Mercer County, a 67-year old male from Raleigh County, a 75-year old female from Greenbrier County, a 71-year old female from Lincoln County, an 89-year old female from Mercer County, a 90-year old female from Barbour County, an 83-year old male from Wetzel County, a 70-year old male from Summers County, a 67-year old female from Marion County, a 96-year old female from Barbour County, an 81-year old male from Preston County, a 69-year old male from Barbour County, and an 80-year old male from Kanawha County.

Russia Attacks Ukraine; Peace in Europe 'Shattered'

ARSAW, Poland (AP) — Russian troops launched a broad, three-pronged assault on Ukraine that opened with air and missile strikes on Ukrainian military facilities and included ground troops invading from Crimea.

Ukraine's leadership called a "full-scale war" aimed at destroying a Western-looking democracy intent on escaping Moscow's orbit. The health minister said 57 Ukrainians have been killed as a result of the Russian invasion and 169 more were wounded.

As Ukrainian forces fought back and civilians piled into trains and cars to flee, the U.S. and European leaders rushed to respond, if not directly in Ukraine, with strong financial sanctions to punish Russia. NATO moved to strengthen its eastern flank.

Here are the things to know about the conflict over Ukraine and the security crisis in Eastern Europe:

PUTIN MAKES HIS MOVE

In a televised address as the attack began, Russian President Vladimir Putin said it was needed to protect civilians in eastern Ukraine, where Ukrainian forces and Russia-backed separatists have been fighting for almost eight years.

The U.S. had predicted Putin would falsely claim

that the rebel-held regions were under attack to justify an invasion.

The Russian leader warned other countries that any attempt to interfere in Ukraine would "lead to consequences you have never seen in history" — a dark threat implying Russia was prepared to use its nuclear weapons.

Putin accused the U.S. and its allies of ignoring Russia's demands to block Ukraine from ever joining NATO and offer Moscow security guarantees.

Putin said Russia does not intend to occupy Ukraine but plans to "demilitarize" it. He urged Ukrainian servicemen to "immediately put down arms and go home." Soon after his address, explosions were heard in the cities of Kyiv, Kharkiv and Odesa.

Hours later the Russian Defense Ministry confirmed that its ground forces had moved into Ukraine from Crimea, saying they advanced toward the city of Kherson to the northwest.

The ministry said it has destroyed 83 Ukrainian military facilities.

Ukraine's leadership said Ukraine lost control of the Chernobyl nuclear site, where Ukrainian forces waged a fierce battle with Russian troops. A nuclear reactor at the plant 130 kilometers (80 miles) north of Ukraine's capital, Kyiv, exploded in April 1986.

UKRAINE'S PRESIDENT URGES CALM

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, who had repeatedly appealed to Putin in recent days to pursue a diplomatic path instead of taking military action, issued a video statement declaring martial law.

He told Ukrainians that the United States was gathering international support to respond to Russia. He urged residents to remain calm and to stay at home, and urged world leaders Thursday to provide defense assistance and help protect Ukraine's airspace.

THE WEST REACTS

World leaders decried the start of an invasion that could cause massive casualties, topple Ukraine's democratically elected government and threaten the post-Cold War balance.

NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg called Russia's attack "a brutal act of war" and said Moscow had shattered peace on the European continent.

U.S. President Joe Biden

said Putin "has chosen a premeditated war that will bring a catastrophic loss of life and human suffering."

The leaders of the Group of Seven called on the international community "to condemn this attack in the strongest possible terms, to stand shoulder to shoulder with Ukraine, and raise their voice against this blatant violation of the fundamental principles of



The Back Pew: February 24, 2022

It's crunch time at the capitol. Only two weeks remain in the legislative session. Things will move very quickly now, so stay up to date by following my updates on social media.

Virtual Town Hall

Please join me for a virtual town hall on Tuesday, March 1, at 530pm. I welcome all constituents to ask questions about what's going on at the legislature. Veterinary School

There's a nationwide shortage of veterinarians and vet techs. Especially those who work on large animals in rural areas. On my recommendation, the Senate Agriculture Committee is calling for a formal study of adding a veterinary school and new vet tech programs in West Virginia. This will help secure the future of agriculture in our region for

Trails

A number of folks reached out to me this week regarding several bills which allow motorized vehicles on walking/horseback riding trails. One bill would allow ATVs, but it hasn't made it on an agenda yet. One would allow certain motorized bikes, and I voted NO on it. Trails designed for walking and horseback riding should remain that way. ATV trails should be just for ATVs. We need both types of trails in WV, but they should remain separate.

State Parks

A bill to privatize state park operations (SB485) passed committee by a single vote. It allows the director of the Division of Natural Resources to sign contracts of up to 50 years with private companies to provide services at state parks. I do not support this effort, because our state parks are affordable treasures. Why should we give away what has been built with taxpayer dollars? It's fine for private compa-

nies to provide certain services at state parks, but this bill takes it way too far.

Micro Schools

Speaking of taking it too far, a bill allowing "micro schools" establishes a new category of schools which can have up to 100 students with zero health, safety, or learning parameters. They are fully unregulated. I'm supportive of educational choices, but this takes it too far. Schools are responsible for taking care of our kids and must be subject to basic health, safety, and learning parameters. When my amendment to do that was rejected, I voted NO.

Athletic Transfers

I voted against a bill (SB586) this week that allows student athletes to transfer schools more often. Several local coaches reached out to me arguing it was a bad idea, and I agreed. We shouldn't encourage recruiting. We shouldn't allow transfers to take roster spots from local students. High school sports should be a place where everyone gets a

shot to play, learn, and grow.

Flood Demolitions

I'm chairing the subcommittee on flood demolitions. At our meeting last week, we took initial steps towards creating a proposal to find additional demolitions of flooded buildings across West Virginia using American Rescue Plan funds. Stay tuned.

Retirees

Many folks are reaching out about SB432, which provides a one-time supplement for retirees in the state. I'm a co-sponsor, so I support it. Unfortunately, it does not look like it will be put up for a vote.

That's the view from the back pew, where it is my privilege to serve you. Don't hesitate to reach out. I'm here to serve you and your family!

international peace and security."

The head of the U.N. refugee agency urged neighboring countries to keep their borders open for Ukrainians fleeing the fighting. U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees Filippo Grandi said his agency had stepped up its operations and capacity in both Ukraine and its neighbors.

WORLD MARKETS FALL
World stock markets plunged and oil prices soared over concerns that heating bills and food prices would skyrocket.

Beyond its human toll, the conflict looks set to send prices spiraling even higher at gasoline pumps and grocery stores around the world.

WHAT SANCTIONS ARE WESTERN POWERS IMPOSING?

In announcing a new round of sanctions on Thursday, Biden said the U.S. and its allies will block the assets of four large Russian banks, impose export controls and sanction oligarchs.

The penalties fall in line with the White House's insistence that it would look to hit Russia's financial system and Putin's inner circle, while also imposing export controls that would aim to starve Russia's industries and military of U.S. semiconductors and other high-tech products.

New U.S. sanctions also targeted the military and financial institutions of Belarus, which Russia is using as a staging ground for its troops moving into Ukraine from the north.

British Prime Minis-

ter Boris Johnson said he would aim to cut Russia off from the U.K.'s financial market.

The sanctions include freezing the assets of all major Russian banks, including VTB Bank, its second-biggest. Britain also plans to bar Russian companies and the Russian government from raising money on U.K. markets.

Britain will ban the export of a wide range of high-tech products, including semiconductors, to Russia and bar its flagship airline, Aeroflot, from landing at U.K. airports.

Meanwhile, the European Union planned the "strongest, the harshest package" ever, to be considered at a summit on Thursday, according to EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell.

EU BEEFS UP PEACE-KEEPING FORCE IN BOSNIA

The European Union-led peacekeeping force in Bosnia announced that it would double the number of its ground troops to prevent ripple effects from the conflict in Ukraine.

The force described the step as a precautionary move. "The deterioration of the security situation internationally has the potential to spread instability" to the ethnically divided Balkan country, it said.

A staunchly pro-Russian Bosnian Serb leader, Milorad Dodik, has for years advocated the separation of the semi-autonomous Bosnian Serb mini-state from the rest of the country.

Last winter, with tacit support from Moscow, Dodik intensified his secessionist campaign, pledging

to form an exclusively Serb army, judiciary and tax system.

The EU force announced that four companies of its reserve forces from Austria, Bulgaria, Romania and Slovakia would deploy to Bosnia over the next two weeks to reinforce its 600-strong contingent already stationed in the country. The new deployments will total 500 troops.

NATO'S EASTERN FLANK

The countries on NATO's eastern flank, all under Soviet domination during the Cold War, are especially nervous.

The Baltic states of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia wondered if they could be the Kremlin's next target. They all have received the first batches of U.S. military troops and equipment as promised this week by Biden.

Poles were also shaken. The parliament in Poland, which borders both Ukraine and Belarus, strongly denounced Russia's attack on Ukraine and vowed its support to Ukraine.

U.S. Ambassador Mark Brzezinski sought to assure Poland that it is safe. He noted there are now 10,000 U.S. soldiers in Poland. More than half were deployed in recent weeks in response to the Russian threats.

Stoltenberg said: "Make no mistake: We will defend every ally against any attack on every inch of NATO territory."

CHINA'S SUPPORT FOR RUSSIA

China's customs agency on Thursday approved

imports of wheat from all regions of Russia, a move that could help to reduce the impact of possible Western sanctions.

China's market is a growth area for other suppliers, but Beijing had barred imports until now from Russia's main wheat-growing areas due to concern about possible fungus and other contamination.

Russia is one of the biggest wheat producers, but its exports would be vulnerable if its foreign markets blocked shipments in response to its attack on Ukraine.

Thursday's announcement said Russia would "take all measures" to prevent contamination by wheat smut fungus and would suspend exports to China if it was found.

UKRAINE SEES MORE CYBERATTACKS

The websites of Ukraine's defense, foreign and interior ministries were unreachable or painfully slow to load Thursday morning after a punishing wave of distributed-denial-of-service attacks as Russia struck at its neighbor.

In addition to DDoS attacks on Wednesday, cybersecurity researchers said unidentified attackers had infected hundreds of computers with destructive malware, some in neighboring Latvia and Lithuania.

Officials had long expected cyberattacks to precede and accompany any Russian military incursion.

arated from them because they were doing drugs. I have serious depression, and my foster family hasn't noticed. I have given them plenty of signs (I have trouble talking about my feelings), but they ignore them.

I had a best friend who helped me through the pain, but she started showing her true colors and turned out to be a jerk. I am also having trouble finding someone who will love me, because I want to be in love.

Everyone treats me like a little kid, even though I'm the oldest. Sorry for dumping all my problems on you, but I really need help. It's not fun crying myself to sleep every night. -- **DEPRESSED**

GIRL IN IOWA DEAR DEPRESSED

GIRL: I am sure it's not fun. You have had some hurdles to climb, but you are in your teens and not a "little kid." You should not be keeping your sadness bottled up inside. That's why it's important you find a trusted adult you can talk with about your feelings. If you are in school, a counselor or teacher you trust may be able to provide the support and understanding you are looking for. While most people want to find someone to love who will love them back, I think you would be wise to put that on the back burner until you are stronger emotionally. If you can do that, you will make

better choices in the future.

DEAR ABBY: I committed a sin with my husband's brother many years ago that I have regretted ever since. I have confessed to God, but I need to tell someone. (I know you cannot absolve my mistake.)

My husband was not very affectionate, but we went on to have a family and many good years together. I guess I don't feel I deserved all those blessings. How can I get rid of this feeling of guilt for what I did? -- **EVIL LADY IN THE SOUTH**

DEAR LADY: Because you won't allow me to absolve you from the "one sin you committed many years ago," please discuss it with a religious adviser. If you are

afraid to do that with your own priest, pastor, rabbi, etc., make an appointment to talk with one in a different community. While you may be racked with guilt, believe me, nothing you confess is something they haven't heard before. I hope it helps you to stop flogging yourself.

Dear Recycle Lady

Dear Recycle Lady, My child brought a Pringle's snack pack home from a friend's house that was a small container of potato chips covered with aluminum foil. Can this small piece of aluminum foil be recycled? All For Using Foil

Dear All For Using Foil,

Yes, small pieces of aluminum foil can be recycled. Give it the "aluminum test" by crinkling it up, then release it. If it is aluminum, it will remain crinkled. Shiny materials that look like alu-

minum will spring back to nearly the original shape.

Dear Recycle Lady,

I must mail out several letters at a time and often use up all address labels on a page. Is the sheet of paper address labels come on recyclable? Why aren't address labels recyclable? **Uses Address Labels**

Dear Uses Address Labels,

The address labels themselves are recyclable. If they are used on envelopes and white paper, they can be put in with office paper. If they

are used on colored envelopes, they are recycled with magazines. It is the shiny paper that the address labels are stuck to that is not recyclable, as the sheet itself contains plastic that enables the labels to be removed. The glue on the labels is not a problem.

Dear Recycle Lady,

Why must colored envelopes be put in with magazines and not office paper? **Likes Color**

Dear Likes Color,

Envelopes that are colored are difficult to dye, as the fi-

bers they are made with are not white. Make a tear in the envelope. If the tear shows only color, the envelope is recycled with magazines. If the tear shows white inside, the envelope is recycled with office paper. The same thing is true with bright colored paper. Tearing them will show color, which is impossible to dye for later recycling.

Kudos to the Shepherd's Center in Lewisburg for serving a tasty boxed/take-home lunch to participants in a light cardboard box that is recyclable with cardboard

and 100% compostable. Additionally, the delicious cookies were in a waxed paper baggie, not a plastic baggie. Also, Kudos to the WVSOM O'Cafe for using the eco-friendly boxes and bags when they prepared the boxed lunches for the Shepherd's Center as part of their community involvement program. Hopefully, more groups will follow their example and not use hard plastic containers or Styrofoam take-out containers and plastic baggies.

ter City Football Center, England, has banned single-use plastics from their Etihad Stadium which will save 1 million plastic cups and 500,000 plastic bottles from being thrown away every football (soccer) season. (Fto.com)

Brockington Brings Iowa State Back, Tops West Virginia 84-81

AMES, Iowa (AP) — Izaiah Brockington stole an inbound pass underneath the Iowa State basket and scored with 22.6 seconds left to give the Cyclones the lead en route to an 84-81 comeback victory over West Virginia on Wednesday night.

Iowa State trailed by 12 points with more than 14 minutes left, but Brockington put the team on his back, scoring 19 of his career-high 35 points in the final 9:40 to bring the Cyclones back.

West Virginia has lost four straight games this season after leading at halftime and five straight overall.

Brockington scored six straight points, including a dunk to take the lead at

60-58 with 8:23 left. Later, Brockington missed an open jumper, snared the rebound and drove into the lane and drew a foul with 28 seconds left, but missed the first free throw before making the second to cut the West Virginia lead to 81-80. The Cyclones defended the inbounds pass and forced the Mountaineers to take a timeout, and on the following inbounds play, Brockington got a hand on the ball, picked it up and scored to take the lead at 82-81.

Malik Curry drove the lane, but his short jumper with 15 seconds left went hard off the iron and the Mountaineers missed three tip-in attempts before Gabe Kalschauer got the rebound for Iowa State,

was fouled and made two free throws to set the final score.

Brockington hit 14 of 22 shots from the field, including 5 of 8 from beyond the arc to give Iowa State (19-9, 6-9 Big 12) its third straight win since snapping a four-game losing streak. Kalschauer added 19 points and Tyrese Hunter contributed 10 points and grabbed nine rebounds.

Gabe Osabuohien and Curry each scored 19 points off the bench to lead West Virginia (14-14, 3-12). Taz Sherman added 15 points and Sean McNeil contributed 11.

West Virginia returns home to play No. 20 Texas Saturday.

The Cyclones play at Kansas State Saturday.

Legislative Subcommittee On Flooding looking At American Rescue Plan Act funds To Help With 2016 Flooding Effort

CHARLESTON, W.Va. — Members of the West Virginia Legislature's newly formed legislative subcommittee on flooding held their first meeting on Friday, where they discussed their primary goal of getting federal American Rescue Plan Act funding into the hands of property owners who still need to tear down structures destroyed by the June 2016 flood.

The subcommittee, led by Senate Minority Leader Stephen Baldwin, D-Greenbrier, was formed following the announcement that the RISE WV Clearance and Demolition Program, created to assist with flood recovery efforts, had been under federal investigation and no longer had the funds to help all those who still need structure demolition.

Also serving on the subcommittee are Del. Caleb Hanna, R-Nicholas, Del. Ed Evans, D-McDowell, Del. Dean Jeffries, R-Kanawha, and Sen. Chandler Swope, R-Mercer.

During the subcommittee's meeting, members discussed the main ideas that should be included in the funding proposal, which must be submitted to the legislature before any federal money may be received.

Andrew Robinson, representing U.S. Sen. Joe Manchin, was present during the meeting. He said it was his understanding that American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding could be used for structure demolition, but that structures would still need to have been damaged by the flood in some way before money could be allocated to property owners.

Greenbrier County Commissioner Tammy Tinch, who attended the meeting via Zoom, added that "counties had a huge part in being able to allow the demolition and abandoned structures inclusion in the final rule." She explained that through the work of county officials, the ARPA ruling on providing funding for flood damaged properties came into existence.

"In all honesty, it came from West Virginia because of our situation where we have so many structures across the state, and the impact that it has on our economic growth," Tinch continued, adding that she would like to see it written into the subcommittee's proposal that structures not originally included in the RISE WV Clearance and Demolition program be included in the ARPA funding proposal.

"I think that is very important," she stated, noting that it would give counties the ability to focus on "overall cleanup."

She then asked for a clarification of Senate Bill 552, currently moving through the legislative process, and wanted to know if it would align with the goals of the subcommittee as they draft their proposal.

Sen. Swope responded to her question that the bill, announced by State Auditor John "JB" McCuskey on Feb. 1, is "focused on properties that are currently in the ownership of the state through forfeitures," adding there are "thousands of

them" that need to be demolished. He continued that "the good news" about the bill is that McCuskey has asked Gov. Jim Justice for \$30 million in surplus money to address the concern.

"His bill will use the Department of Environmental Protection as the administrative agent, so any money that could go through the DEP program can be parallel to the program we are talking about here, depending on the ownership," Swope said. "If we get an amount like \$30 million, we can make a pretty big showing somewhere."

"I think each project you do almost has to be an isolated project," Swope continued, noting that a 2018 West Virginia University research study estimated statewide residential demolition projects will cost about \$150 million and other building demolition projects will cost about \$400 million.

The focus of the conversation then shifted to creating eligibility requirements to re-

ceive ARPA funding and finding an administrative agent.

Swope stated that he is willing to speak with DEP officials to determine if they would be the appropriate administrative agency and he suggested that all counties should pass ordinances giving them the right to condemn dilapidated structures and hire a building inspector.

House Bill 4319, also moving through the legislative process, would require county assessors "to identify defective and dilapidated properties for subsequent enforcement proceedings" and provide appropriate personnel training through the Division of Emergency Management.

Swope added that he has been recommending this type of enforcement for some time. He also noted that through the current demolition model, the contractor has the right to salvage, but counties should utilize government owned property to set up a clearance and demolition landfill to avoid expensive flood debris

disposal costs, often \$30 a ton. Additionally, the state should partner with the DEP to create asbestos removal contracts, which would minimize final costs.

Jennifer Ferrell, director of the Community Advancement and Development division of the West Virginia Development office, added that any bidding contract should include specifications for property remediation and include language for old car and out-building removal.

At the meeting's conclusion, Baldwin stated "we will do our homework, put something together, send it out to everyone for feedback and have it ready for when we get back together."

The counties that had been considered most impacted by the June 2016 flood include Clay, Kanawha, Nicholas and Greenbrier. Additional counties considered impacted by the flood include Fayette, Jackson, Monroe, Pocahontas, Lincoln, Roane, Summers and Webster.
