COVID-19 update

The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) reports as of April 22, 2022, there are currently 544 active COVID-19 cases statewide. There has been one death reported since the last report, with a total of 6,823 deaths attributed to COVID-19.

DHHR has confirmed the death of a 93-year old male from Mason County.

"As we send sympathies to this family, I urge everyone in West Virginia to do their part to stop the spread of this virus and prevent further loss of life," said Bill J. Crouch, DHHR Cabinet Secretary. "Please schedule your COVID-19 vaccine or booster shot today."

Court seeks solution to opened emails in homicide case

As a summer trial looms, the case against Terri Storer for two homicides could still be dismissed due to potential breaches of attorney-client privilege.

Storer was indicted on two counts of murder for the 2019 shooting of Jeremiah and Jennifer Thomas. Randy Barnhart was indicted on two counts of accessory after the fact to murder.

Earlier this year, the defense moved the indictment be dismissed as a result of an email between attorney and client potentially being read by investigators before the case was indicted. In March, the lead investigator Senior Trooper B.J. Borsman of the West Virginia State Police testified he had opened an email produced from Google with a warrant.

"I didn't read the email," Borsman testified. "I opened

the link for the email. I was able to determine, based on the first couple of words, ... and I may be completely wrong, ... I believed it to be an email shared from a client to an attorney."

Greenbrier County Circuit Court Judge Robert Richardson left the record open after that hearing, allowing the defense and prosecution to submit additional evidence. The potential of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) reviewing the computer in question to see which emails were opened and/or read was introduced on March 11.

"The essential request to the FBI was to be a tracing of Trooper Borsman's steps," explained Greenbrier County Prosecuting Attorney Pat Via. "The emails that were opened, those that weren't, things of that nature. [They could potentially] electronically be able to follow what

Trooper Borsman did or did not do with respect to the material issue. Upon further consultation with the Bureau, they have agreed to undertake the work. ... Until they get into the computer, they could not provide any assurance that they could provide us answers. ... I think it's fair to say there was some level of confidence that they could achieve some of the tasks, a little less confidence on some of the rest of it. [The computer is] currently in the evidence room at the West Virginia State Police at the Lewisburg detachment."

However, this option came with an objection from Storer's defense attorney, Brandon Johnson.

"We wanted someone there as a representative for the defendant, and we had secured someone that would do that," explained Johnson. "What Pat Via told

us [is] the FBI simply found that was something they would not agree to do, which I find a little shocking. If the shoe was on the other foot, they certainly would want a representative there. I think it's because of that very fact, that they won't cooperate, that we feel like there needs to be some other avenue that we pursue. We don't particularly want to delay this, but we didn't cause it. ... I'm pretty shocked that's the FBI's position."

"I can confirm that," Via said. "I had proposed a defense representative be present and I was told that they're not going to do that. It would be a circumstance where they and they alone would do the analysis and provide us with their findings."

Without another person in the room representing the defendant, the FBI could be out as a potential way to re-

solve the issue. However, if another party is found that could accomplish the same task, the state has similar concerns for a different reason.

"I suspect that there is significant confidential information concerning other investigations that may be on the computer," Via noted. "We would need to have some mechanism to provide for the security of that other information without damaging or interfering with access to the information to be examined."

Richardson approved the parties to find another solution, with the case moving forward in early May.

"We'll remind the parties that this case is scheduled for trial this summer," said Richardson. "We do have some time but not an unlimited amount of time."

Lewisburg encourages fire departments to inspect underwater equipment

The Lewisburg City Council considered damages to fire department equipment, a 1 percent sales tax, the new public works building, and more during the Tuesday, April 19, meeting.

A member of the Lewisburg Fire Department noticing a hole in an important piece of equipment lead to Fire Chief Joe Thomas asking to replace nearly the entire set.

"We had a hole in one of our air bottles, which is something I've never heard of," said Thomas. "We started pulling the bottles, checking, and ... we found 24 bottles that had corrosion inside. They are the airtight bottles we use during underwater search and rescue. Nobody's ever heard of this problem. We have those 24 bottles are out of service now. They've been pulled off our trucks. [To replace them] here's probably going to be an expenditure somewhere between."

Thomas said the bottles were purchased around 2013 and were expected to be in service until 2027 or 2028. About half of the bottles purchased at that time were affected.

"We haven't had to pull anything that's really detrimental to us being operational," Thomas noted. "One's leaking through the side of the bottle. It's got an aluminum liner on the inside, that's what [something] ate through. Then it's a carbon fiber wrap that protects the bottle. It's fairly thick, but the carbon fiber doesn't actually stop it from leaking."

Thomas told council he estimates the cost to replace the entire equipment set between \$225,000 to \$275,000.

"I think this could also be a public service announce-

ment as well for other fire departments to check their packs, especially if it's that same year," said Lewisburg Mayor Beverly White.

In other business:

- Lewisburg's application for Home Rule status was passed on second reading and public hearing with no public comment but a question from a reporter. If allowed Home Rule status, the city would be able to enact a 1 percent sales tax. In a previous meeting, city manager Missy Hill said that should that tax have been in place in fiscal year 2020-2021, \$1,891,309.97 in revenue would have been collected.

- White celebrated an award given to the city from the Central Greenbrier Little League. She said, "we received this on opening day [from] the Little League. I threw the first pitch. It says, 'Lewisburg, in recognition of your unwavering dedication and exceptional support of the youth in our communities,' signed the Greenbrier Little League."
- Several ordinances on bonds for the new Lewisburg Public Works building had second readings approved by council, with third reading and public hearings expected before passage.
- Bids for the new pub-

lic works building were not approved, as the low bidder had hand-modified their bid, invalidating the document. Due to the large difference between the two bids, both were rejected. The city will rebid the project in the upcoming weeks.

- A resolution supporting the Ukrainian people was approved by council. Lewisburg Recorder Shannon Beatty read the resolution aloud, saying "on February 24, 2022, Russian forces launched an unprovoked, full-scale invasion of a peaceful independent country in Ukraine. Many nations, including the United States and its European allies, have condemned, in the strongest language, this horrifying attack, an outright war of aggression on Ukraine and its citizens. [It is an] attempt to overthrow the democracy and occupying Ukraine, and sanctions have been levied against Russia and its government in response to this attack, with calls for an immediate ceasefire withdrawal. Yet Russia's invasion continues." Council member Arron Seams "emphatically" moved to support the

WVSOM recognized for creating culture of wellness on campus

LEWISBURG (WVDN) – The West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine (WVSOM) is one of only 156 universities and colleges – and the only osteopathic medical school – in the world to be recognized by Exercise is Medicine for its efforts to create a culture of wellness on campus.

The medical school earned a silver level designation from Exercise is Medicine On Campus (EIM-OC), a program created by the American College of Sports Medicine and the American Medical Association. Exercise is Medicine is grounded on the belief that physical activity promotes optimal health, is integral to the prevention and treatment of many medical conditions and should be regularly assessed and included as part of health care.

DeMartino said. “Aside from being a way to treat cardiovascular disease and diabetes, exercise is extremely beneficial for many clinical populations. Boxing is one of the best exercises for patients with Parkinson’s disease to improve brain and motor function, weightlifting allows stroke patients to regain confidence and independence, and cancer patients are now being recommended to exercise as a ‘pre-habilitation’ to build strength before starting chemotherapy and radiation. Exercise is the most versatile treatment and should be prescribed to every patient.”

DeMartino hopes to make WVSOM students aware of the benefits of exercise so they can incorporate that knowledge into future physician-patient encounters.

“WVSOM and osteopathic medicine are focused on the philosophy of using the body to heal itself. Exercise strengthens the body to combat, prevent and treat diseases,” she said.

elementary-aged children in the community; Health Yeah committee members provide nutritional education opportunities to community members; and the WVSOM chapter of the Lifestyle Medicine Club aims to educate members about the evidence-based practice of helping individuals and families adopt health behaviors that affect quality of life and emphasize how to incorporate nutrition and lifestyle-based preventive medicine into healing modalities.

In addition to identifying patients who perform less than 150 minutes per week of moderate physical activity, a referral system from the clinic would be implemented to connect patients with local exercise specialists trained in individualized exercise prescriptions for different diseases and conditions, making it easier for physicians to discuss exercise with patients and making it easier for patients to start exercising, DeMartino said.

Another goal DeMartino has to allow WVSOM to achieve gold status is to incorporate PAVS into students’ clinical skills classes and into the computers at the school’s Clinical Evaluation Center in order to flag inactivity.

DeMartino is passionate about the Exercise is Medicine program and believes it is an important way to extend treatment options beyond pharmaceutical treatment.

Christopher Pankey, Ph.D., a WVSOM assistant professor of physiology, was approached in fall 2021 by two first-year medical students who were interested in incorporating the program at the school.

The Exercise is Medicine program is a natural fit for osteopathic medicine, which focuses on a whole-person approach to treating patients, Pankey said.

Robyn Stuhr, vice president of Exercise is Medicine, said program members are thrilled to recognize campuses that make movement a part of daily culture.

“Exercise has immense benefits for a variety of clinical presentations,” Pankey said. “We live in an area at the epicenter of the obesity epidemic

“I believe most students came to WVSOM because we wanted to find a treatment method that best suits our patients, which includes osteopathic manipulative medicine but should also include exercise as medicine. Exercise improves quality of life and decreases mortality and morbidity,” she said. “When patients inquire about health advice and physicians don’t recommend exercise, it is unlikely the patient will make it a priority. Exercise is a less invasive treatment with fewer side effects and should be considered a first-line treatment for most patients.”

Campuses with silver distinctions engage students, faculty and staff in education initiatives and make movement part of the daily campus culture. Pankey said at WVSOM, those goals were achieved by campus committees and clubs, such as the Culinary Medicine Club, which teaches students nutritional information through cooking demonstrations and other activities.

“Students interested in osteopathic medicine already incorporate osteopathic tenets that fit really well into this program,” he said. “These tenets teach that the body is a unit and it has self-healing properties. We can amplify those self-healing properties through physical activity and exercise.”

“These campus programs are nurturing future leaders who will advance a key tenet of Exercise is Medicine: making physical activity assessment and promotion a standard in health care,” she said.

status, disability, genetic information, or other category that is protected under federal state or local anti-discrimination laws.”

Class of 2025 student Samantha DeMartino, one of the students who introduced the program at WVSOM, said she wanted to bring the program to campus to help future physicians better understand exercise physiology.

Program enthusiasts like DeMartino are pursuing an elective for WVSOM students that would include activities such as estimating patients’ optimum heart rates to use for an exercise prescription, discussing different exercises to benefit specific populations and getting into the gym to apply these concepts.

Of the 156 campuses recognized this year, 73 received a gold designation, 60 received silver and 23 received bronze.

How women professionals can make more time for family

Women wear many hats every day. That's especially true for women juggling families and careers. Chauffeur, negotiator, advocate, moderator, mom, wife, and employee are just some of the titles that apply to modern women.

Data from the U.S. Department of Labor and the U.S. Census Bureau indicate women represent nearly half of the United States workforce, but women still devote more time than men to housework and child care. While few are advocating for traditional gender roles of the past to be reinstated, a 2012 Pew Research survey found that very few adults (16 percent) indicated having a mother who works full-time is the "ideal situation" for the

family. Nearly 42 percent said a mother who works part-time is ideal. Even among full-time working mothers, only about 20 percent said that having a full-time working mother is ideal for young children.

"Ideal" is not always practical, and since the Pew survey, the workforce has changed in many ways, particularly by the number of employers who have adopted family-friendly policies or pivoted to remote working during the COVID-19 pandemic. That means working moms have even greater leverage to find a balance that works for their unique situations. These tips can help women free up more time for what's most meaningful to them.

- Employ time-saving strategies. Embrace ways to save time during the day. Order groceries online during a lunch break and pick them up curbside after work. Pool resources with a neighbor to cover school transportation if busing is not provided. Schedule conference calls during commutes so they don't eat into the rest of the day.

- Define your priorities. Think about what cannot be compromised or negotiated. Maybe that is being home at a particular time each day so the family enjoys dinner together.

Get clear ideas of what you value most so you can build plans around those priorities.

- Take vacation time. Make it a point to use all vacation time, coordinating days off to coincide with family members' days off. Family vacations offer the best shots at uninterrupted, enjoyable time together. They should be ranked highly and scheduled early to ensure travel is possible.

- Use technology to stay connected. There are times when the family may not be

able to gather in person. This became evident at the start of the pandemic, when social distancing and isolation became a cautionary tactic to prevent disease proliferation. If the kids are missing you or you are missing the kids at any time during the day, a video chat can be just what everyone needs to feel better.

- Outsource housework and chores with smart ideas. If the budget is there, hire a housekeeper to come in weekly to tame messes around the house. A "mom's helper" can be hired to come in and

tend to certain needs. Family calendar apps can serve as personal assistants to keep track of family appointments. Clothing subscription boxes save time and provide a way to have carefully curated outfits shipped right to your home. A robot vacuum can tame dog fur on the rug while you are working in a home office. These ideas can free up additional time to spend with the family.


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


A Day for Children in Mexico!

In Mexico, Children's Day (Día Del Niño) is celebrated on April 30th. On this day, there are no classes in schools. Instead, schools organize games and music.






